Greeting Caldwell Church family and friends, Hope your week is going well; stay healthy and let's keep each other in prayer.

Here we are already in the heart of December; the 4th week of celebrating the Advent season anticipating the Birth of Christ, and patiently await His Second Advent. In these four (4) weeks, each Sunday we are highlighting God's promises revealed in the Christmas story and celebrating Jesus' Birth. The season is usually one filled with singing and songs of the season: *O Come, O Come Emmanuel, It Came upon the Midnight Clear, O, little Town of Bethlehem, Joy to the World, and Silent Night;* with a few Fa-lalas added. There are many great songs and carols that help make the season bright. It is hard to imagine Christmas without hymns, carols, and songs of the season; they can bring us comfort and joy.

In my messages leading up to Christmas, I have highlighted several of the Church's hymns we find directly in the Bible: *Zechariah's Song from Luke 1:68-79. Mary's Song - The Magnificat found in Luke 1:46-55. The Angel's Song in Luke 2:14, and Simeon's Song; the old priest who blessed Jesus and Mary and Joseph from Luke 2:29-32; this is called "Nunc Dimittis:* "Now, let your Servant Depart in Peace", a song of praise for seeing the Messiah. These are hymns of the ancient church, which we have used for 2000 years. (I'm glad Luke included them in his Gospel.)

I am looking forward in celebrating this second Christmas with you; even though our first Christmas Eve service was cancelled because of bad weather. Let's pray this year, it's a go! Christmas is an exciting time. The sanctuary looks wonderful for Advent and Christmas. This year seems still a little different from past years because of the Co-vid virus; our gathering may be limited, but we are still focusing on the coming of Jesus the Christ-child.

Look for the Advent services and our Christmas Eve: *Carols, Candlelight, and Communion,* in person or on facebook, watch our weekly message, and use devotional material on the Church's website: <u>www.caldwellohumc.org</u>. Let us live our lives in the hope of all God's blessing, find peace in God's promises, experience joy in the presence of Jesus in our lives, and share the love of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, with each other.











Christmas Crossword



Christmas means "Christ-mass." Although the date is a guess, the tradition of observing it goes back to at least the fourth century. Under the influence of the church, Christian traditions replaced pagan solstice festivals throughout Europe. Often the more innocent pagan practices (such as bringing in a Yule log, decorating with holly and the like) were carried over into the Christmas observance, transfigured with new

The Christian Meaning Behind Ancient Traditions

Evergreen Trees were the symbol of eternal life. Martin Luther introduced them to the Reformation Church as a picture of our endless life in Christ, by bringing in a tree to his family on Christmas Eve lit with candles (Isaiah 60:13)

Candles are a picture that Christ is the Light of the world (John 8).

Holly speaks of the thorns in His crown (Matthew 27:29).

Red is a color of Christmas that speaks of Christ's blood and death. **Gifts** are a reminder of the gifts of the Magi to baby Jesus. Each of them speak to a component of His incarnation: Majesty in life, Bitterest Agony in Death and He as God's Perfect gift to us (<u>Matthew 2</u>).

The Yule Log was a symbol by which all the men in the family would carry a log large enough to burn for 12 days into the house. They were identifying with Christ and His Cross. The fire was started with a fragment from the previous years [this refers to the eternal existence of Christ before His birth] log. It speaks of warmth, unity, joy and the security of endless life.

Mistletoe was an ancient symbol from the Roman times. It was under mistletoe that old enmities and broken friendship were restored. So Christ was the One who took away the enmity and gave us peace with God (<u>Romans 5:1; Romans 8:1</u>).

Bells are associated with ringing out news. Christ is the good news, the best news of all.

Santa Claus is a Dutch word that is actually Sinter Claus, Saint Nicholas, in English.



Saint Nicholas was the supposed early Bishop of a church in Asia Minor [the modern country of Turkey]. He became aware of some desperate needs in his congregation, and a family having to sell their children into slavery, so one night he came and left money on their doorstep. It was gold in a stocking.

The winter solstice is the shortest day and longest night of the year. In the Northern Hemisphere, it takes place in 2021 on Dec. 21. Cultures around the world have long held feasts and celebrated holidays around the winter solstice. Fire and light are traditional symbols of celebrations held on the darkest day of the year.





Who put the "X" in Xmas?



Merry X may You've probably heard the phrase "Keep Christ in Christmas." The idea is always the same: let's not rub out the religious roots of this holiday by saying "Xmas," instead of Christmas.

For us as Christians, [Christmas] is one of the most holy of the holidays, the birth of our savior Jesus Christ. And we don't like for people to take Christ out of Christmas. They're happy to say merry Xmas. Let's just take Jesus out. And really, some think it's a war against the name of Jesus Christ.

This is of a-piece with those who fret that saying "happy holidays" is somehow scrubbing the season's religious ties away. But those who make this argument are barking up the wrong tree, because, you see, the X in "Xmas" *literally* means Jesus. Allow us to explain.

How can the letter "X" stand for "Christ"?

In Greek, the language of the New Testament, the word Christos (Christ) begins with the letter "X, "Xplotoc or *chi*. Our letter 'P' is rho in Greek. Chi is written as an 'X' and Rho is written as a 'P', but they are the first two letters of the Greek word Christ 'savior'. 'XP' is sometimes used to stand for Christ. Sometimes 'X' is used alone. This is the case in the Chi (X) abbreviation for Christ in Xmas.

In the early fourth century, Constantine the Great, Roman Emperor from 306-337, popularized this shorthand for Christ. According to legend, on the eve of his great battle against Maxentius, Constantine had a vision that led him to create a military banner emblazoned with the first two letters of Christ on it: *chi* and *rho*. (our X and P)

So Xmas also means Christmas; but it should also be pronounced 'Christmas' rather than 'ex-mas'!
